# What does English look like at Key Stage 4?

- English is a compulsory subject. Most colleges and apprenticeships will require you to have **at least a Grade 4 in English**. If you do not get a Grade 4, you are required to re-sit the exam until you get the Grade 4.
- English is divided into two separate qualifications: English Literature and English Language.
- The higher of the two grades will carry over as your English grade.
- You will have eight lessons of English per fortnight.

# The structure of the exam:

- There are two papers
- Paper 1: Fiction
- Paper 2: Non-fiction
- Unseen texts
  - Each paper is worth 50% of the GCSE
- Spoken Language is separately assessed and is required to validate the award.

The structure of the exam:

There are two papers\*

- Paper 1: Shakespeare and the 19th Century Novel
- Paper 2: 20<sup>th</sup> Century Text and Poetry
- Paper 2 is weighted to carry slightly more marks than Paper 1



The English Literature exam requires students to have studied:

- One Shakespearean play: Romeo & Juliet;
- One 19<sup>th</sup> Century Novel: A Christmas Carol;
- One modern prose/drama: An Inspector Calls;
- A selection of 15 poems from an Anthology: Power and Conflict.

In addition to this, students are tested on their ability to analyse an Unseen Poem and to compare that poem with a second Unseen Poem. In order to endorse the exam, students will give a presentation on a topic of their choice, which will demonstrate their spoken language abilities and ability to answer questions about their topic.




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At Stoke High School, we pride ourselves on the strength of teaching within the department. In order to maximise the chances of success, students are offered:
