Why Choose BTEC Music Practice?

Engage

This course will give you the chance to engage with music through a range of performing, composing and production tasks.

Develop

You will develop your music appreciation skills from a wide range of music, from Western Classical music through to modern day pop.

Explore

You will look at a range of jobs in the music industry.

Practical

You will get the chance to develop your performance skills on your chosen instrument (including vocals) and perform to a range of audiences.





You will explore 8 different genres of music - creating a range of practical, composing production and listening products. You will look at a range of different job roles in the music industry and how they work together to create these products.





You will develop your skills on your chosen instrument. You will explore job roles associated with your skills and develop your skills to create a performance for an audience.



Careers


- Performing roles (session musician, backing singer, solo artist etc)
