
<u>The Art of Revision and Homework</u>

One of the surprising things that can be observed as a teacher is the number of times the same questions ring out in the classroom: "Why do I have to do homework?"

One of the main reasons that we ask students to complete homework is to ensure that students can become independent learners, a skill that will be vital once they have left Stoke High School. Homework can reinforce key knowledge, which in turn means that exams become a little bit less stressful.

A good example of this can be seen across our year groups. In Year 7, for example, students learn about the concept of patriarchy at the beginning of their first unit of study. This is emphasised and built on each year, so that when the students start their GCSE in English, they can discuss this without any difficulty. It becomes a part of their everyday analytical thought process. It creates a sense of success for students, and this diet of rich vocabulary can lead to higher grades in the exam.

Homework in English also allows students to be tested on core knowledge. It allows them to build up a vocabulary of key words, or key terms, which are vital for students to be able to achieve success across their exams.



Getting into good homework habits is also excellent for thinking about revision, particularly before Year 11. By completing the homework set, it encourages students to be independent, and to apply the knowledge learned in the classroom to the tasks that have been assigned.

This half-term, we have organised a homework competition for Year 10, and many of the students have taken this very seriously. Each class has the opportunity to win a £15 Amazon Voucher, and there has been a strong improvement in students

completing their homework. If we can get into good habits, it becomes easier to do the work as it is assigned.

All this leads us to the dreaded revision...

Revision is vital. Revision should also be ongoing. Revision allows us to access the information we need to successfully answer questions, or complete tasks.

In English, revision means the recall of information. From plots and key characters to important quotations and language devices used by writers, revision is about knowing the texts we study. For each student the best way for them to learn, and revise the subject, may be different. However, it is important that students are supported in this. I would strongly encourage you to ask your child what is in the exams and ask them questions that allow them to show you just how much they know. You may be surprised to find out the depth of their knowledge!

Science Faculty

Year 11 updates!

PPEs are done and dusted and the final furlong has begun.

Results of the PPEs are being given to students and the final 26 Science lessons have been mapped and planned to maximise revision for GCSEs. All lessons will focus on exam technique around graphs, standard form and significant figures in the first part of the lesson moving on to a specific exam topic with past paper questions to support their understanding.

Just a reminder that all students will receive a copy of the Physics equations in their exam so no need to learn these. The few remaining Biology and Chemistry equations will need to be learnt.

Students have been made aware of the following revision platforms to support them this term. <u>www.senecalearning.com</u>, <u>www.freesciencelessons.co.uk</u> and the CGP app can also be downloaded. The exam board for Science is AQA Trilogy.

What have we been learning about?

The Year 7 students have successfully transitioned from their settling in phase and are actively engaged in practical lessons. Currently, they are studying the respiratory system and the anatomy of the lungs, with plans to explore separating solutions in the upcoming weeks.

In Year 8, students have been engaging in valuable lessons on Acids and Alkalis. They have actively participated in practical activities involving the use of indicators to determine the pH of various household items. These lessons also encompassed important safety measures. Moving forward, the students will explore neutralizations and the process of creating salts.

The Year 9 students have commenced a fresh Biology unit focusing on cells and their structure, with a plethora of unfamiliar terms to grasp. Adjustments have been made for students who have switched groups to ensure targeted learning. An end-of-unit assessment is scheduled before the Easter break, with subsequent lessons dedicated to revision techniques.

Year 10 students have progressed in their GCSE course by studying more advanced Chemistry topics. They will now shift their focus to the biology topic of photosynthesis. These topics will be covered in the final paper one exams, which will take place before the end of the school year. Students who wish to prepare in advance can refer to the information provided in the year 11 section. The topics covered will include Biology 1-4, Chemistry 1-5, and Physics 1-4. Revision strategies will be discussed in class once again.


<u>History</u>

Geography

Moving forward into the next term we are looking forward to working with the library to bring students high quality literature that relates to their geography learning and providing enrichment opportunities for students to use their geographical knowledge. In the summer term students will be focusing on settlements, rivers, sustainability and fieldwork skills. This is with the aim to provide more outdoor learning opportunities as the weather improves. 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Our RE curriculum reflects the important month for Muslims currently with year 9 learning more about the faith of Islam. This topic allows students to develop an understanding of the key practices within Islam, consider moral issues through the lens of the religion and think about the divergent views of the faith. After the Easter holidays, year 9 will study a philosophy module looking at



'What gives life worth?'. This will allow students to consider different points of view and debates on the right to life and death and consider some important moral issues in our society today.

Year 8 have been looking at Christianity and Buddhism and considering the ethical issues of crime, law and order. They have been utilising their analysis skills to understand if these two religions agree on issues around punishment and justice and where there are distinct views in the religions. Students will move on to Sikhism next and consider the place of women in the Sikh religion. Students will learn about the role of leaders in the religion, the key texts and how Sikhs apply them to life in twenty first century Britain.

Year 7 have been enthusiastic about learning Christianity and trying to answer some big philosophical questions on the role of reconciliation and sacrifice in the faith. The next topic will allow students to develop their philosophical thinking even more, and we are going to explore how philosophy can teach us what the right action is in any given situation. I am really happy to tell you all about our amazing trip to Paris over the last weekend of the February half term.

We were a large group, made up of 49 students from Year 10 and Year 11 and 5 members of staff. There were students of French, Art, Photography and Food Technology and the staff members were Mrs Howe, Miss Ashmore, Miss Roxburgh, Mr James and Mr Moxon.

We had a really early start on Saturday 24th February, with parents and students gathering in the school car park at 4:30 in the morning, bleary-eyed, handing in passports by torch light and saying our goodbyes. By 5:00 we were on our way to France.

As we were bowling down the motorway towards Dover, and I was checking the itinerary for the evening, our fantastic coach drivers noticed that our restaurant for that evening was not 10 minutes walk from the hotel as previously arranged, but 2 and a half hours away! Luckily I was able to obtain 54 metro tickets at short notice and our students were able to experience the Paris metro as well as have a nice buffet meal in a restaurant right next to the Arc de Triomphe, all lit up at night.

We were then driven to the Louvre Museum, where we explored the incredible collection of artworks, including the Mona Lisa. This museum is so immense and labyrinthine that many students said they would like to have had more time there to find their way around!

We then visited the Musee d'Art Moderne, where Miss Roxburgh was very much in her element, providing context and background for many of the artworks. It was a beautiful, calm space right next to the river Seine and provided a much needed opportunity for some students to sit and relax and maybe even doze a little!

Then it was back in the coach to go the famous Montmartre district of Paris, where we climbed a lot steps to the beautiful Sacre Coeur basilica. Students had some free time and many courageously sat down in cafes and ordered a hot meal or wandered around buying souvenirs from Paris. The weather was really cold and wet, but it didn't seem to dampen spirits. The whole day came to a spectacular close when we arrived at a viewpoint for the Eiffel Tower just as it started to spectacularly twinkle with thousands of fairy lights. Fantastique!

The next day we took a super-fast lift to the 56th floor of the Montparnasse Tower for a 360degree view the whole of Paris. We could pin-point a lot of the places we had already seen and then we went right to the terrace at the top and took a group photograph.

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
