Summer and the joy of reading

As the six-week summer break approaches, it is very easy to forget how quickly the routines and expectations of school fade into the background.

We live in a world that is full of distractions. Some of them are positive, some of them are negative, but all of them can make us forget some of life's simple pleasures.



Here are some useful tips for reading in the summer:

• Short and frequent

Try 2-3 hours a week to prevent learning loss.

Attempting to break this demanding target down into fewer, shorter periods is more likely to foster successful retention of reading skills. Long, tiring periods of reading increase the potential for future reluctance. Make sure to make these short sessions frequent to keep these skills fresh in the child's mind. Why not ask your child to read to younger siblings, if they have any, or to read to you.

• Read the things that are of interest.

Allowing the freedom to choose a preferred subject or topic to read around heightens a child's enthusiasm for reading. Free from the restrictions of formal teaching, enabling the ability to pursue an interest increases the likelihood and enthusiasm for reading. Reading around something the child is interested in will make sure the skills they have gained at school are consolidated.

• Explore together

Aim to expand reading outside traditional settings and resources, even where there may not be an abundance of reading to be done. Exhibitions, museums and galleries, are a great way to maintain literacy skills and are also a lovely day out activity.

Ultimately, any attempt to do extra reading work over the long break is great. Efforts may not always seem to be immediately be rewarding, but the more reading done over the summer, the better placed and more ready your child will be for their next year of study at Stoke High School!

<u>History</u>

As we approach the end of another fantastic term, we wanted to take a moment to share some of the brilliant work happening in History lessons this summer and celebrate our students' learning across Key Stage 3 and 4.



Year 7 have been learning about the fascinating Tudor dynasty! From the reign of Henry VIII to the impact of his many marriages, students have been exploring key questions such as: 'Was Henry VIII a terrible tyrant?' and 'How much did life change under Tudor rule?' There have been fantastic class discussions around power, religion, and the lives of ordinary people during this period.

Year 8 have been studying some of history's most revolutionary moments! From the American War for independence to the French and Russian Revolutions, students have been thinking critically about what causes revolution and how societies change.

Year 9 have approached one of the most important and challenging topics in history: the Holocaust. Through careful and respectful study, students have learned about the causes and consequences of Nazi persecution, the experiences of Jewish people and other victims, and the importance of remembering and learning from the past. We are incredibly proud of the mature and thoughtful way they have engaged with this topic.

Year 10 have recently completed their PPEs and showed great focus and resilience throughout. They are now turning their attention to our next GCSE topic: Weimar and Nazi Germany. Students are exploring how Hitler rose to power, how the Nazi regime-controlled Germany, and what life was like for different groups under Nazi rule. This is a crucial part of their GCSE course, and we're impressed with the maturity they are bringing to such a significant topic.

Recommend Summer Reads

Treason by Berlie Doherty: (Suitable for Year 7+) Set during the reign of Henry VIII, this gripping historical novel follows a boy drawn into the dangerous politics of the Tudor court. A brilliant companion to our Year 7 topic on the Tudors.

Revolution by Jennifer Donnelly: (Suitable for Year 8+) A powerful



story that blends modern-day grief with the drama of the French Revolution. Ideal for Year 8 students who've enjoyed learning about revolutions through time.

Once by Morris Gleitzman: (Suitable for Year 9+) Told through the eyes of a young Jewish boy, this moving and accessible novel introduces the Holocaust in a deeply human way. A poignant read for those who want to reflect further on our Year 9 studies.

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<u>Geography</u>

This term in Geography Year 7 have been studying Settlements and looking at Conflict in the Middle East through a Geography perspective. Year 8 have been finishing their topic on Rivers and Flooding and are moving onto look at Glaciation towards the end of the term. Year 9 have completed their unit on Sustainability in the 21st Century and are enjoying looking at



the continent of Africa in more detail. For GCSE students in Year 10, now their PPEs are finished, we are beginning to prepare them for the fieldwork on Qualitative Surveys and Cycles and Flows which we will undertake in September in Dedham.

<u>RE</u>

Our RE curriculum in the summer term has encouraged Year 7 to try and answer the big philosophical questions such as 'What is right and wrong?'. Students have been learning about key philosophers such as Plato and Aristotle, exploring their views and if these are still relevant today. Using philosophy to help answer questions is a great skill to use for future when making any ethical decisions.

Year 8 have been studying the Sikh faith and exploring the beliefs that are distinctive to the Sikh faith and considering links concepts and ideas in other religions studies such as Christianity, and the Jewish faith. While year 9 have been utilising all their knowledge, skills and understanding built up in RE to consider what gives life worth. Students have been applying this learning to moral issues including organ donation and euthanasia – topics which have been in the news.

Students can look forward to many religions and philosophical ideas being explored and a change of department name to Religious Studies!

This years theme was taking liberties based around the Ipswich Charter Festival 825, which celebrates Ipswich's first charter by King John in 1200AD. As Drama Club we decided that this also linked with Stoke High School's 125 years celebration and set about devising a piece themed around the past, present and



the future, and the ways that charters and various political movements are designed for change. After a devising workshop lead by NWT practitioners, we then developed our piece thinking about how things might not necessarily change as we expect them when there are different rulers and different governments. What we ended up with was a powerful performance, devised completely by the students, questioning what actually changes in the end. Our key words were discrimination, freedom and equality.

We then had the pleasure of performing alongside a few other schools from Suffolk, at the NWT festival and the evening was just amazing! The students from Drama Club certainly did the school proud, not only with the way that they performed on stage, but with their conduct and behaviour throughout. Once again, I was very proud with what we achieved.

Beatboxing Workshop

With our partnership with Norfolk and Suffolk Music Hub, we were able to welcome Beatboxer Mide Naike to school to conduct a workshop with selected students. Despite the traffic chaos invading the daily commute, Mide was able to deliver the workshop to the students that ranged from Years 8 - 9 that gave them some background into the genre, tips and hints in how to perform the various parts of a drum and vocals.

The workshop was a real insight into the different musical talents and abilities that our students have themselves, and have an interest in.

Houses of Parliament Trip

Some of our students were invited to come and take part in a trip to the Houses of Parliament. This was led by the Wolsey 550 project. Thanks to this team, this was a free event and one which was incredibly fun and enlightening. This is what Maddie from Year 9 had to say about the trip:



On Monday the 23rd of June, 9 pupils went to the Houses of Parliament which is also known as the Palace of Westminster. When we were there, we went on a tour. This tour told us the history of the Houses of Parliament and what happens there. We learnt that on the last day of the Blitz (11th May 1941) the Houses of Parliament got bombed but one archway remained standing. Winston Churchill decided to keep this, and it is now a symbol of hope and perseverance. Also, there was a piece of art which was made up with all the petitions for women's rights. This then glows up depending on the River Thames' tides. While on the tour we went into the House of Commons and House of Lords and learnt how they pass bills and how they vote on them. We also saw a bill move from the House of Commons to the House of Lords. The

House of Commons is decorated in green, whereas the House of Lords is decorated in red. After the tour, we had a Q&A with Jack Abbott who is the MP for Ipswich. It was very interesting to

hear what his responses were and his plans for the future of Ipswich. The day ended with two workshops after lunch. The first was where you had to guess from a panel of employees who had what job. The second workshop explored skills needed to access specific jobs and what barriers we had to overcome to achieve these roles. I had a fantastic time at the Houses of Parliament.
